







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Welcome to the 32nd Annual Meeting of BSPGHAN, returning to Leeds after an interval of seventeen years. This meeting coincides with the 250th anniversary of the General Infirmary in Leeds: at that time Leeds, located in the Aire Valley, was a major centre for production and trading of wool. It has since grown from a mill town to its present status as the cultural, financial and commercial heart of West Yorkshire and Yorkshire's largest city. A similar expansion has seen the General Infirmary develop into the Leeds Teaching Hospital Trust, providing local, regional and specialist services for children and adults alike.

The meeting will benefit from the city's compact size, its good rail connections and striking architecture, including the Art Deco grade II listed building Queen's Hotel. Built for the redesigned Leeds railway station in 1937 and celebrating its eightieth year, it will be the venue for the conference and gala dinner, which will have a 1930s theme.

The BSPGHAN meeting will provide a forum for research presentations, with an educational content encompassing three major themes: access, national initiatives and therapeutic advances.

Access for delivery of treatment is explored through invited speakers sharing their expertise on enteral feeding routes, intravenous line options and robotic and interventional approaches for vascular and hepatobiliary surgery.

National initiatives of the last 12 months will be highlighted, including an update on the RCPCH/BSPGHAN standards, the Lancet commission report on liver disease, the 100,000 genome project and Endoscopic Global Rating Scale programme.

Therapeutic challenges will include symposia and guest lectures on long term safety of monoclonal therapies and other forms of immunosuppression, as well as the innovative field of modelling drug interactions and advances in parenteral nutrition.

The importance of inflammatory bowel disease to our society will be reflected by the inclusion of two experts in their very different fields: Lesley Dibley will address the priorities for Nurse Led Research, and Yoram Inspector will share his expertise in providing Psychological support.

Nutrition is of fundamental importance to all aspects of gastroenterology and hepatology. In addition to a session addressing the challenges of assessing malnutrition and providing nutritional care, there will also be a symposium devoted to obesity, reflecting its growing importance to society.

The final lecture will be delivered by Paddy McClean on the past, present and future of liver disease. This should provide food for thought to all in the Society, and not just hepatologists: reflecting on how medicine has evolved over decades, how new diseases are being identified and genetic basis understood, and the changing face of the health service. It will be a particularly fitting finale to the meeting in Leeds, especially as 2018 will mark Paddy's retirement.

No meeting would be complete without the opportunity for social interaction and networking: through poster sessions, evening dinners and football. Finally, with Leeds being dubbed the Knightsbridge of the North and also being renowned for its nightlife, the opportunities for extracurricular activities within walking distance of the Conference venue are endless.

She was Medical Director of the Children's Hospital (2000-2007). She has been President of the European Society of Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (ESPGHAN) (2006-2010), British Society for Paediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition (BSPGHAN) (2004-2007) and the International Pediatric Transplant Association (IPTA) (2002-2005).

She is on the Council of the General Medical Council (2013-) and is a Non-Executive Director of the Health Research Authority (2014-). She was a Commissioner on the Care Quality Commission (2008-2013) and Healthcare Commission (2007-2009).

She was the Paediatric Lead on the Lancet Standing Commission on Liver Disease (2013-2017).

Professor Kelly is author of several textbooks about paediatric liver disease and has published many original articles and chapters on liver disease, liver transplantation and viral hepatitis.

Professor Kelly was made a CBE (Commander of the British Empire) by her Majesty the Queen in 2016 and received the ESPGHAN Distinguished Service Award in 2016.

Bob Phillips

Bob is a Senior Clinical Academic at CRD, and an Honorary Consultant in Paediatric / Teenage-Young Adult Oncology at Leeds Children's Hospital. His main area of work is in the development of individual participant data (IPD) meta-analysis, and the development of skills in appraisal and translation of clinical research in practice. He is the lead of the PICNICC collaboration, "Predicting Infectious ComplicatioNs In Children with Cancer" which was formed by engaging international clinical and methodological experts, parent representatives and healthcare researchers to investigate primarily the patterns of risk in febrile neutropenia. The PICNICC collaboration consists of 22 different study groups from 15 countries and is actively engaged in involving new members from around the world to further develop its aims. This work develops the CRD research themes of methodological improvement in IPD metaanalysis and in improving outcomes in cancer medicine, and capacity building and translation of research in the NHS.

Bob has worked extensively to promote and teach evidence-based practice with the Centre for Evidence-based Medicine in Oxford, UK, and also the Centre for Evidence-based Child Health (Institute of Child Health, London, UK). He edits the evidence-based practice sections of the Archives of Diseases in Childhood, and is an associate editor of the journal. He has lectured in the UK, Europe, North America, Australia and the Nordic Countries on the subject of evidence-based practice, and has written widely on this.

Bob was the Clinical Lead for the NICE Guideline (CG151) on the management of Neutropenic Sepsis. In addition to the work in febrile neutropenia, he has undertaken many systematic reviews assessing the quality of evidence underlying interventions to ameliorate the side-effects of cancer treatments in childhood. This includes a Cochrane systematic review of the treatment of chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting, the treatment of constipation, and risk stratification in nephropathy. He works with the Cochrane Child Health field, the PRISMA-IPD group, and the Department of Health-funded Children and Young People's Health Outcomes forum to encourage the production, development and use of high-quality health research in the care of children and young people.



Professor Amin Rostami-Hodjegan, PhD, FCP, FAAPS, FJSSX

Amin is a Professor of Systems Pharmacology at the Centre for Applied Pharmacokinetic Research (CAPKR) at the University of Manchester. He has an active program of training PhD students involving proteomics, physiologically-based pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics and precision dosing within CAPKR. Amin was a Professor of Systems Pharmacology at the University of Sheffield prior to joining the University of Manchester and numerous graduates from his team are currently active in pharmaceutical industry or academic research. A 2017 highly cited researcher, Professor Rostami has authored/co-authored over 220 peer-reviewed full articles and serves on the Editorial Boards of several journals. Alison joined CLDF as Chief Executive in September 2013 from Meningitis Now, where she was Director of Services, Research and Education. In her earlier career, she spent six years in a senior leadership role within the hospice movement, prior to that managing disability advocacy and advice services.

CLDF is the only UK charity dedicated to fighting all childhood liver diseases. In addition to her role as CEO, Alison is a member of the Lancet Commission addressing liver disease in the UK, and the Joint Chair of the liver patients transplant consortium. She also sits on the Welsh Liver Disease Implementation Group, and the Liver Steering Group which supports the National Paediatric Liver Service.

Alison's main focus is on providing services and research which provide the best outcomes for children, young people and families affected by all childhood liver diseases and ensuring their voice is heard in decisions affecting related policy and care. Working with young people transitioning to adult care is a bed rock of the work undertaken by the charity, with a dedicated support team. In 2016 the charity was shortlisted for The Children and Young People Now charity of the year award for the impact of one of its' innovative projects for young people - Talk, Tell, Transform.

Jonathan Sutcliffe is a Consultant Paediatric Surgeon at the Leeds General Infirmary subspecialising in Colorectal Surgery. His research interests include Interstitial Cells of Cajal in human disease processes, including disorders of intestinal motility. Other research interests are the use of tissue expansion and tissue engineering to simplify the management of Cloaca and the use of biomarkers in children.

He was part of the Guideline Development Group for the NICE Guidance on Constipation in Children and has led on its implementation locally.
